Exam Day Process:

- •Students log in to **Bluebook** via College Board account.
- •They follow a check-in process guided by the proctor.
- •Scratch paper is provided for drafting answers.

Exam Experience Features Section I: Multiple Choice

- 1. Directions on the screen's top left; timer and battery indicator navigate on top right.
- 2. Students can back and forth between questions within the section time limit.
- 3. Highlights include:
 - Adjustable panel sizes for text and questions.
 - Note-taking, highlighting (three colors), and underlining capabilities.
 - "Mark for review" feature for returning to flagged questions.
- 4. Ends with an automatic transition to Section II after a 10-minute break.

Section II: Free Response

- 1. Text editor for entering and formatting responses.
- 2. Work is auto-saved; responses cannot use cut/copy/paste for passages, but you can copy/paste from other responses.
- 3. Timer functions the same as in Section I.
- 4. Students can navigate between questions until time expires.
- 5. Spelling is not checked, and it will not impact scores.



Indeed, although nomads are normally included in the analysis of the political context of trans-Eurasian exchange, they are typically left out of the cultural equation. Here the great sedentary civilizations are placed at center stage, particularly when scientific and cultural transfers are under consideration. But, as we have seen, pastoral nomads were the chief initiators, promoters, and agents of this exchange between East and West [in the thirteenth and fourteenth centuries]."



Section I: Multiple Choice

- •Features:
 - Timer with countdown (can be hidden)
 - Navigation between questions.
 - Adjustable pane sizes, note-taking, and highlighting tools.
 - Calculator use:
 - Desmos Graphing Calculator is built into Bluebook for most exams.
 - AP Statistics does not allow Desmos.
 - Calculus: Calculator only in Part B.
 - Reference materials (e.g., periodic table for AP Chemistry) accessible via the Reference menu.

Section II: Free Response

- •Prompts and instructions are displayed in Bluebook
- •Students write answers in paper booklets
- •Specifics:
 - Booklets are subject-specific (e.g., lined pages for AP Biology, grids where appropriate
 - Calculus/Precalculus:
 - Calculators allowed in Part A only. Each part is separately timed.
 - AP Physics:
 - Includes version-specific questions.
 - Students must write on the corresponding page for their version.



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The enzyme trypsin aids in protein digestion in the small intestine. The relative activity of trypsin at different pH values is shown in Figure 1.



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


Which of the following statements best explains the activity levels of trypsin shown in Figure 1?

- At extremely low pH values, trypsin is denatured and cannot function efficiently.



























A **test preview** is a short set of questions that lets you experience digital testing and try out all the tools. You won't receive scores or any feedback on your answers.
